PBIS

On November 15, we had an afternoon of celebrating student achievement and successes we have seen in the school so far this year. We started with an assembly where we talked about our PBIS goals and the progress we are making towards our goals so far. We then recognized students for good attendance, perfect attendance and Student of the Trimester awards.

Our goal for Trimester 1 was to improve student attendance. Last year during Trimester 1 only 59% of our students attending 90% of the school days or more. Our goal was to increase the number of students attending 90% of school days (missing 5 or fewer days) to 75%. We surpassed our goal and had 84% of students attend 90% of school days! This number includes 22 students who had perfect attendance!

For trimester 2, we will continue to focus on attendance; the best way to learn is to be in school! We are also adding a second goal, pertaining to behaviors. At the end of Trimester 1 we were averaging 1.41 minor referrals per day. Our goal is to reduce this number to 1 minor referral per day over the course of Trimester 2.

In order to help lower minor referrals, we will be teaching lessons in Advisory a few days a week pertaining to different character traits. So far, we have spent 3 weeks teaching about Empathy. The next 3 weeks will be spending time talking about Personal Responsibility. Looking ahead, we will be talking about Decision Making Skills next.

Why Attendance Matters

By 6th grade, chronic absenteeism (missing 10% (18 days) of school or more) is the leading indicator that a student will drop out of HS. There are many learning opportunities that happen every day in school that extend far beyond material covered in core classes. The ability to get along with others, work together, be reliable, prepared, perseverance, and problem solving skills are all things that can be learned through regular attendance. We know that absences will happen, the key is to limiting them as much as possible.

Common Myths:

1. Absences are only a problem when unexcused.

Any absence, whether excused or not, denies a student the opportunity to learn.

2. Sporadic absences aren't as bad as consecutive absences.

All absences lead to gaps in learning and eventually add up.

3. Attendance only matters in High School.

Patterns created in MS carry on into the HS. It can be very difficult to change once a habit is created.
